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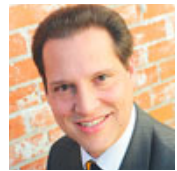

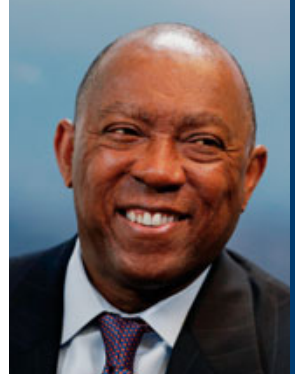

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**JFD gets fourth seed
Brook volleyball earns
first-ever championship**

After 31 years, the Clear Brook varsity volleyball program has its first-ever district crown. With senior Kailin Newsome setting a program record for career and single-season kills, the Lady Wolverines rolled past Alvin 25-21, 25-18, 25-8 Oct. 25 at home, securing the District 24-6A championship.

Lady Wolverines' head coach Meredith Thompson, a Clear Creek ISD lifer who played both volleyball and soccer at Clear Creek High School, then guided her team to a season-ending win over Clear Lake Oct. 29, wrapping up a memorable season for the locals.

Newsome had 19 kills in the match as Clear Brook capped its 11-1 district push with a 25-12, 25-20, 25-13 victory. The Lady Wolverines, who will face Brazoswood in the bidistrict playoffs Nov. 4-5, is 26-9 overall this season.

On the same night at Pasadena Memorial, Dobie lost its regular season finale to the Lady Mavericks 25-19, 27-25, 25-22 but still grabbed the fourth and final playoff seed with a 9-7 record. Memorial took fifth place at 8-8.

Dobie, which will now play Deer Park Nov. 4-5 in the bidistrict playoff round, was led in kills by Alayna Gonzalez.

Dobie's Campa continues remarkable run, heads to state

Alberto Campa's remarkable junior season on the cross-country trails will continue after he took 14th place overall at the Region III Championships, automatically punching his ticket for the state meet next month.

District qualifiers from across the area gathered Oct. 28 at Kate Barr Ross Memorial Park, with the top 15 individual finishers from each regional automatically qualifying for the state meet.

With a strong push coming from his Dobie family of teammates who made the trip to Huntsville as spectators, Campa posted a time of 16 minutes, 23.40 seconds on the 5,000-meter course to keep his season very much alive and well.

As expected, La Porte High School senior and Oklahoma State University commit Ryan Schoppe was the Region III champion after crossing the finish line in under 15 minutes (14:59.20).

Nick Majerus, the two-time defending District 22-6A champion, was the runner-up with a time of 15:42.40 for second place.

Region III boys' team champion Seven Lakes placed three runners in the top 12 to win the crown with a low of 89 points.

In the 5,000-meter girls' race, District 22-6A champion Avery Clover of Atascocita claimed the top spot at the regional as well, winning the event in

a time of 18:24.50. Kingwood, which dominated the 22-6A championships, did so at region-

als as well. Getting three runners into the top six, the Lady Mustangs easily won the Region III crown with a low of 42 points.

Pasadena ISD's Sam Rayburn finished 12th as a team to complete its season, with Texans' runner Raul Lopez taking 40th place in the event.

The University Interscholastic League's all-classes State Championships will be held Saturday, Nov. 9 at Settlers Park in Round Rock.

The Class 6A 5,000-meter finale is scheduled to go off at 3:10 p.m.

Schoppe, who at 14:43.88 was second a season ago at state, figures to be in the hunt for the state title, but the race should be ultra-competitive.

From regionals, five runners from Region I bested the 15-minute mark, and The Woodlands' Ryan Cardinal, who was third in the 2018 state

championships, had the best overall time at regionals at 14:38.86.

Denton Guyer's Brynn Brown, the top returning finisher from the 6A state girls' race in 2018 and the owner of the nation's current fastest 5,000-meter time, was diagnosed with a stress fracture in her right foot earlier this month and was forced to forgo the remainder of the season.

 \$12.5 million in general revenue funds during the first two years, assuming debt service payments based on the issuance of this new debt.
Prop. #7 Funding Public Education
 "The constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions to the available school fund."
 The School Land Board, an independent entity of the General Land Office, oversees the management, sale and leasing of more than 13 million acres of land for the Permanent School Fund. The State Board of Education can then make distributions from this fund to the Available School Fund. The revenue generated from the land is used to purchase real estate and make investments to help fund public education through the Available School Fund.
 This proposition would increase from \$300 million to \$600 million the amount the General Land Office could distribute to the Available School Fund each year.
Arguments for
 This proposition will improve funding for public schools by doubling the distribution from the School Land Board to the Available

School Fund.
 Were it not for the \$300 million cap in the Texas Constitution, this could have been happening already, making more money available for public education.
 As more money is available to school districts from the state Available School Fund, they should need to rely less on local property taxes.
Arguments against
 Both the School Land Board and the State Board of Education have responsibilities for managing the Permanent School Fund. If the School Land Board makes larger deposits directly to the Available School Fund rather than into the Permanent School Fund, it changes the amount the State Board of Education is required to distribute from the Permanent School Fund.
 The State Board of Education is required to make a percentage-based biennial distribution to the Available School Fund. If they have less money in the Permanent School Fund, it might result in lower overall school funding.
 In the past, the School Land Board made questionable investments at the expense of public education

funding. With the opportunity to make larger contributions, it might increase the lure of debatable investments.
Prop. #8 Flood Control
 "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the flood infrastructure fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control projects."
 Proposition 8 would create the Flood Infrastructure Fund (FIF) as a special fund outside of general revenue. A one-time distribution from the Economic Stabilization Fund, also known as the "rainy day fund," would establish the FIF. The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) would distribute FIF funds to local governments through loans or, in some cases, as grants. The money would be used to establish and maintain flood control structures and drainage infrastructure throughout the state, especially in economically distressed areas.
 If passed, Proposition 8 would require cooperation among all impacted parties. A local government would receive money from the FIF only if it worked with other governments in the region

and listened to stakeholder concerns in public meetings. The local government would also have to submit a technical analysis of the plan, comparing it to other possible projects in the region, and a proposal to repay the loan.
Arguments for
 Severe flooding events such as Hurricane Harvey show the necessity of being prepared to prevent future damage.
 Access to federal funding and grants often requires local governments to match the amount of money the federal government would provide. The proposed amendment would allow the TWDB to give loans to local governments so they could access federal funds.
 Because removing money from the Economic Stabilization Fund to create the FIF would be a one-time expense, rather than ongoing, it would not drain the "rainy day fund."
Arguments against
 A local government could default on a TWDB loan, thereby costing the state income meant to replenish the FIF. Taxpayers might ultimately be liable for repayment of loans.
 Historically, state government has not played a heavy

role in funding flood-control infrastructure. Flood control is the responsibility of both local and federal governments, rather than state government.
 Using money from the "rainy day fund" to establish the FIF could be inappropriate because only one-time expenses or funds for disaster response should be removed from the "rainy day fund." Because the FIF itself is an ongoing project, funds to create it should be taken from general revenue.
Prop. #9 Tax Exemption of Precious Metals
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state."
 Texas opened a precious metals depository in 2018, run by a private company but overseen by the state government. The Constitution requires all real and tangible personal property to be taxed on its value unless exempted.

These ad valorem (property) taxes are imposed at the time of purchase or exchange of precious metals. Proposition 9 would exempt from taxation precious metals held in a precious metal depository in the state.
Arguments for
 Other states do not tax precious metals, so creating this exemption would allow Texas depositories to be more competitive.
 The proposed amendment would increase chances that the Texas depository could join COMEX, the leading marketplace for precious metals exchange.
Arguments against
 Texas counties do not enforce the property tax on precious metals, so a constitutional amendment is unnecessary.
 The proposed amendment gives preference through a tax break for precious metals over other investment choices.
Prop. #10 Law Enforcement Animals
 "The constitutional amend-

ment to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified caretaker in certain circumstances."
 Proposition 10 would allow law enforcement animals to retire, and their former handlers or other qualified caretakers to adopt them with no fee.
 Law enforcement animals are currently considered as surplus property of the county, which means the county can only auction, donate, or destroy them. Proposition 10 would change the property laws to allow the animals to retire and be transferred to their original handler or another qualified caretaker with no adoption fee.
Arguments For
 Proposition 10 would ensure the wellbeing of law enforcement animals in their later years by allowing them to retire.
 Proposition 10 would remove the legally required fee for law enforcement officers, or other qualified caretakers, who generally adopt their

own retired law enforcement animals.
 Proposition 10 recognizes the longstanding bond developed between a law enforcement animal and the animal's handler, a bond that would be ignored in a government auction.
Arguments Against
 Proposition 10 may reduce state income. A government auction might raise more money than the free adoption of a law enforcement animal.
 If the animal's handler retires before the animal is ready to retire, it might be difficult to determine which of the animal's handlers had priority.
 It is unfortunate that such a common sense action would require a constitutional amendment.

 Voters who do not have a photo ID or cannot reasonably obtain one may still vote upon signing a form and presenting an original copy of a Voter Registration Card, certified birth certificate, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, or paycheck with one's name and address on it.

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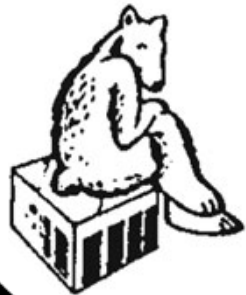
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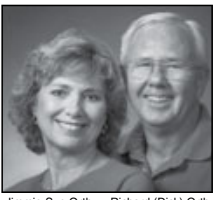

Gunning for that historic 300th win in program history against the Texans, the Longhorns got things rolling quickly on offense.

Gray hooked up with Cameron Guy for a 39-yard touchdown pass and catch on the Longhorns' first series.

A bit later, Gray broke free on a 32-yard touchdown run. And with just 22 seconds left in the first quarter, he found Guy again for 21 yards and a touchdown.

Poised with a 21-lead, the Longhorns basically did what they wanted to do offensively against the Texans.

Tight end Jaylin Griffen

made an acrobatic grab over the middle in the second quarter and rambled 73 yards for the touchdown.

Jonathan Jean made his way to the back of the end zone and reeled in a 6-yard touchdown strike from Gray, the quarterback's fourth of the night.

Up 35-0 at halftime, the Longhorns got long touchdown runs from Gray (50 yards), Trevion Williams (51 yards), Trajan Davis (48 yards) and D'Andre Brinson (51 yards) in the second 24 minutes.

Dobie had 371 yards rushing and also saw Gray go seven for 13 for 189 yards and the four touchdowns.

Rayburn managed 87

yards on the ground but went 0 for 6 through the air. In short, it was business as usual as the Longhorns continued their march.

Next up is South Houston, which has been eliminated from playoff contention but will be celebrating homecoming.

Offensively, the Trojans have relied heavily on quarterback Deandre Corbin, who in recent weeks has become quite a threat in the running game.

Despite the 45-34 loss to Memorial Oct. 25, Corbin had more than 200 yards rushing, and he will likely look to do similar damage to the Longhorns.

So Dobie head coach Kev-

in Berneathy has the Longhorns in the postseason for the second time in his two seasons, and the team has a chance to get to nine wins prior to the start of the post-season.

But for Berneathy, his staff and the players, it's about trusting the process moving forward. It's about improving on a daily basis, regardless of if that means now, tomorrow or next season.

"I tell the guys that the process is the process, and we have done a good job of sticking to that process every day," he said.

"You only get 10 chances in the regular season to go out there and test your process and match your skills against

other programs. So far we have had eight of those tests, and I feel like we have passed seven of them.

"Obviously, we didn't get the job done against Atascocita, but our ultimate goal is to be able to go out there and beat the teams that are at that talent and skill level. I feel like we are taking steps every day."

With South Houston coming up next, the Longhorns would clearly love to dampen the Trojans' homecoming a bit, but it's still more about the process. "Trust is a big thing around here, and I think the guys trust that what we are doing is right," Berneathy said. Getting better is the goal."
